In 1966 Ken Loach made the groundbreaking *Cathy Come Home* for British television. He was part of a new wave of television makers who chose to use the power of the mass media to draw attention to the iniquities of the British class system and to stimulate new ideas about social reform. He was influential in shifting attitudes toward homelessness and the treatment of low-income people in sixties Britain. Loach has never strayed from that original path. He has continued to explore the social, psychological, and economic consequences of working class life. Always on the side of those oppressed by a system designed to fail them. Some of his other works: *The Wind That Shakes the Barley, Land and Freedom, Sorry We Missed You, My Name is Joe, and I, Daniel Blake.* The last one was shown a few years ago in the TCG programme.
